St Michael 's Gymnasium

BMW Factory

BMW, meaning Bavarian Motor Works, is one of the largest production sites in Europe. It all started with buying a few souvenirs from the BMW plant at Dingolfing. We were given a guided tour inside the press shop, the body shop and the assembly. We first walked by the press shop where huge steel and aluminium sheet rolls are converted to 1.6 million body parts for the Dingolfing plant and the production network. The Dingolfing press shop is one of the largest facilities of its kind within the BMW Group. We also got to see a few bodies of the Rolls Royce motor cars.

The body shop at Dingolfing is a high tech light weight construction facility. Here there were approximately 2000 robots that turn the metal sheets into parts which are produced at the press shop into paintable bodies in white. We were then guided to the Assemblying area where, over 6,000 workers fit the painted car bodies with the customised features selected by the customers. About 1,600 BMW cars are assembled on the two assembly lines every day. This experience provided a lot of learning and enhancement along with a visual and

practical approach.

Concentration Camp

On March 22, 1933, just a few weeks after Adolf Hitler was appointed Reich Chancellor, a concentration camp for political prisoners was set up in Dachau. In the twelve years of its existence, over 200,00 persons from throughout Europe were imprisoned in the Dachau concentration camp and its 140 subcamps, persecuted for political, racist and biological 'reasons'.

Years later, after all the horrors, the camp lays untouched and stands in pure silence. The main building of the camp, which is turned into a museum, held the documentary of each prisoner of the three phases of the camp, 1933-1939, 1939-1942, 1942-1945 and the history after 1945. There are several religious memorials within the memorial site. The memorial includes four chapels for the various religions followed by the prisoners. The camp prison consisted of long hallways of bunkers. The grounds were used for various purposes: between 1945 and 1948 the US military imprisoned National socialist officials and members of the SS here, where until 1963/1964 the former camp served as accommodation for refugees.

The Dachau concentration camp was found in the year 1964, the Memorial site is part of the Bavarian Memorial Foundation. It is a place of remembrance for the strong and pure souls; it's a cemetery and at the same time a museum and a place of learning.


